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### NEW AND RARE PLANTS.

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#### **RETINOSPORA** *filifera*.

It is very difficult to give any adequate description of this beautiful plant, which has a pyramidal and exceedingly graceful habit. Its great peculiarity consists in its producing numerous drooping shoots, which frequently attain a length of 10 to 12 inches without branching, and then becoming tufted or crested, giving the plant an elegant tasselled appearance; its bright glaucous green foliage rendering it very striking. Austriaca*, or Black Pine, grown largely for timber. *P. Benthamiana*, a most noble pine. *P. excelsa*, has a beautiful silvery appearance—a splendid specimen when well grown. *P. pinaster*, *P. halepensis*, *P. maritima*, ought to be largely planted for shelter and timber; it thrives on the poorest soils.
